

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The objective of this paper is to familiarize the student with the various aspects of health care and health education. Changes in personal and group attitudes and behavior that promote healthier living and understanding how careful planning and management of health services is essential to the increased demand for medical and health services will be the focus. A comparative study of health problems and health policies of developed and less developed countries and the role of government and non-government agencies will also be discussed.


