INSTRUCTIONS FOR PAPER SETTERS AND CANDIDATES

- (i)The paper H:III is of 100 marks, 50 for theory examination and 50 for presentations. There will be 9 questions in all. **The candidate will be required to attempt questions**
- (ii)Question No. 1 will be compulsory and carry 10 marks. It will consist of 8 short questions, spread over the entire syllabus. The candidate is required to attempt any 5 short answer type questions. Each short question carrying 2 marks, will be answered in 40-50 words.
- (iii) Remaining part of the question paper will be divided into four units, corresponding to the four units of the syllabus. The paper setter will set 2

Essay type questions from each unit. The candidate will attempt 4 essay type questions, selecting one from each unit. Each question will carry 10 marks.

- (iv) The paper setter is expected to follow the Recommended Readings and set questions on the sub themes or parts of a theme, rather than the topic as a whole.
